

ADD/ADHD Assessment (OLD VERSION)

Attention deficit disorder (ADD) is a condition characterized by inattention and distractibility. Individuals with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) exhibit impulsive, unpredictable, and hyperactive behavior. Patients with ADD/ADHD can be disruptive, especially in social situations and often have difficulty completing tasks. It is important to note, that failure to complete tasks is not a result of rebellion or disobedience, but rather inattention. Behavioral patterns consistent with an attention deficit and/or hyperactivity disorder will manifest in children by the age of seven. Typically, ADD/ADHD is not identified or diagnosed until the child enters school. In order to meet the criteria for ADD/ADHD, the pattern of behavior characteristic of these conditions must be present in two settings, at home and at school.

Assessment

Impulsiveness

Impulsive M-pushing

Individuals with ADD/ADHD exhibit impulsive, unpredictable behavior. Impulsivity is especially noticeable when compared to other individuals of the same developmental level.

Disruptive

Disruption-eruption

Patients with ADD/ADHD can be disruptive, especially in social situations. For example, a school-aged child may cause disruptions in the classroom, blurt out answers without being called on, or interrupt others before they are finished speaking.

Inattention

Inattentive N-not-paying-attention

Difficulty paying attention, or inattention, is a predominant trait in these patients. Individuals with ADD/ADHD often have difficulty completing tasks and are easily distracted.

Incomplete Tasks

Incomplete Task-list

Individuals with ADD/ADHD have difficulty completing tasks and will often fail to complete chores, homework, or other obligations in the workplace. It is important to note that failure to complete tasks is not a result of rebellion or disobedience, but rather inattention.

Easily Distracted

Easily Distracted by Easy-button

Patients with ADD/ADHD have a very limited attention span and are easily distracted from the task at hand.

Two Areas of Life

Home and School

In order to meet the criteria for ADD/ADHD, the pattern of behavior characteristic of these conditions must be present in two settings, at home and at school.
