

Provocation

Provocation is an affirmative defense to first degree intentional homicide. Raising the provocation defense means that the defendant admits that he committed a murder, but that the murder was the result of being provoked into the act. Under the common law, provocation essentially mitigates a murder charge to manslaughter.

Second degree murder

Murder is red rum spelled backwards. Provocation is a criminal defense used to justify a mitigated sentence or a conviction for a lesser charge typically in the face of a second degree murder.

There is an intense emotional excitement that prompted violent and aggressive action, such as rage, anger, hatred, furious resentment, fright, or terror.

The provocation must occur immediately before the defendant's act that caused the death. The defendant must not have had a reasonable opportunity to cool off.

Adequate provocation

Aquaduck

This means calculated to inflame the passion of a reasonable man, causing him to act for the moment from passion rather than reason. The provocation by the victim needs to be sufficient to significantly undermine the rationality of a reasonable person.

There are objective circumstances that mitigate murder to manslaughter under the common law, and these include:

- Discovering spouse having sex with someone else
- Mutual combat
- Aggravated assault and battery
- Crime committed against close relatives
- Illegal arrest

Causal connection between provocation and defendant's actions

The chain connecting wife and cheating husband

There must be a causal link between the provocation, the passion, and the homicide.
