

Res Ipsa Loquitur

Res ipsa loquitur (Latin for "the thing itself speaks") is a legal doctrine that permits an inference of negligence, even without direct evidence of the defendant's negligence. The facts presented to the court must meet the three basic requirements.

Negligent necklace

This allows a plaintiff to proceed with a case even when the particular nature of the defendant's negligence cannot be pinpointed. The plaintiff must prove that the defendant's negligence is the most probable cause of her injuries.

Defendant's exclusive control of the instrumentality

X controller and surgical instrument

The accident was caused by an instrumentality that was under the exclusive control of the defendant. The plaintiff's injury or damage must have been caused by an instrumentality or condition that was within the exclusive control of the defendant.

No contributory negligence

Noncontributory patient under anesthesia

The event in question must not have been attributable to any cause for which the plaintiff is responsible.
